From Pastor Sue's Desk:

Now that the UMC General Conference is over, there are some important things that have changed. Some of the changes made national news, and some did not. For more information or greater detail, you can go to: www.umc.org. There are also video sessions that were recorded and are available for viewing at: https://susumc.org/gc. I am sharing what I think are some of the most critical decisions.

Removal of restrictive language related to LGBTQ people: The General Conference voted by overwhelming majorities to remove from the United Methodist Book of Discipline discriminatory language and bans related to ministry by, with and for "self-avowed practicing" gay and lesbian people. This will allow for the ordination of LGBTQ folks, for our clergy to perform LGBTQ weddings and our churches to host the weddings. It is also important to understand that no pastor or church will be forced to do this.

Adoption of worldwide regionalization: Delegates approved legislation that would restructure the denomination to be more contextual in different regions served by the church. This will be official when at least 2/3 of the annual conferences vote to ratify the legislation. The current central conferences and the U.S. would become regional conferences, with the same authority to pass legislation for greater missional impact.

Changes in numbers of bishops, increased diversity in leadership: Two bishops will be added for Africa, for a total of 15, and the number of U.S. bishops was lowered from 39 to 32. Bishop Tracy S. Malone, resident bishop of the East Ohio Conference, became the first Black female president of the Council of Bishops. Bishop David Wilson and Bishop Carlo Rapanut, both former members of Global Ministries Board of Directors, marked historic firsts as Native American and Filipino American bishops to preside over General Conference.

Disaffiliation Policy Ended, Re-affiliation Measure Approved: Delegates removed Paragraph 2553 from the Book of Discipline, ending the disaffiliation policy that was added by the special 2019 General Conference. They also required annual conferences affected by disaffiliation to develop grace-filled policies for reaffiliation of churches that want to rejoin the denomination.

A few more tidbits:

The "Religious Freedom: Grounded in Love" resolution was approved to become part of the United Methodist Book of Resolutions and calls for an end to violence and persecution of others because of their religious beliefs or affiliations. The passing of this legislation invites the global church into the hard work of dialogue, listening and sharing with different faith communities, and also to acts of reconciliation across boundaries that divide our own Christian communities.

The Social Principles were first adopted in 1972, four years after the Methodist and Evangelical United Brethren Churches merged to form the UMC. Since then, some amendments and additions have been made to them, but this is the first time a full revision has been presented at General Conference. There are four main sections: Community of All Creation; Social Community; Economic Community; and Political Community. Over 4,000 United Methodists from around the world read, reviewed and commented on the first Social Principles draft. The UMC Board of Church & Society presented the final draft, which was adopted. The Wesleyan Quadrilateral of Scripture, Tradition, Reason and Experience was central to this revision.

Finally, the Council of Bishops has written a letter to clarify the UMC's position with regard to the Global Methodist Church. This denomination was established in 2022, which sparked the disaffiliation of many UMC churches and pastors. The letter states in part: "We must clarify that the Global Methodist Church has no official relationship with The United Methodist Church and has not been endorsed by any of its official bodies. There has been no request for such a relationship and, as such, there is no communication taking place to negotiate a common understanding of our two bodies. The mission of the church to make and nurture disciples of Jesus Christ is enhanced when various bodies of Christ collaborate in a mutual ministry of grace and respect. Likewise, the mission of the church is harmed by the denigration of one body at the expense of another. To that end, we call upon the members of the Global Methodist Church to formally recognize The United Methodist Church as an authentic and valid denomination and to cease all efforts to coerce members of The United Methodist Church to join their fellowship. Likewise, we commit ourselves to the same standard of respect and grace."

I know that this is a lot of information and I hope that it helpful. As we learn more about how any of this specifically affects the Susquehanna Annual Conference, and Beaver Memorial/St. Paul's, we can have conversation and hopefully answer any questions that arise. As people of faith, let us all be in prayer as we move into the future with love, joy and hope in our hearts.

Dupdates from the Leadership Team

The May 21, 2024 Leadership Team meeting was held jointly with St. Paul's in Fellowship Hall. Pastor Daniel Wilt, as he transitions into his new role as Conference Superintendent, presented items of business pertaining to both Lewisburg churches. These will apply as we become a two-point charge on July 1, 2024.

The first concerned the shared responsibility for the two pastors' salaries. Based on an analysis of each church's membership, attendance and budget, it was determined that each church should contribute 50% toward the combined total salaries. In sharing these costs, Beaver will see a reduction which would amount to \$17,733 for the entire year, but will be half that for the remaining


six months of 2024. This is because Pastor Sue will be serving three-fourths time, for a savings of \$9,805 in salary, and the church is no longer required to pay for health insurance of \$18,360. As a pastor in a full time appointment, the church was required to pay for full insurance, even though she is covered by Kevin's health insurance.

The next item concerned the schedule for Sunday morning services. **Beginning June 16, St. Paul's service will move to 9:00 from 9:30 and Beaver's will move to 11:00 from 10:30**. This leaves the hour between 10 and 11 for Sunday School for children at St. Paul's, and adults at Beaver, as well as transition time for the pastors, including time for them to engage with people after the 9:00 service at St. Paul's and before the 11:00 service at Beaver. On any given Sunday, people should feel free to attend whichever service best suits their plans for the rest of the day.

The third item on the agenda was the establishment of a joint SPRT (Staff Parish Relations Team) to deal solely with any issues concerning the pastors, but not the rest of the staff, which is the responsibility of each individual church. This committee is still in the process of being formed.

VBS at St. Paul's UMC

This summer's VBS will be Sunday July 21 - Thursday July 25 at St. Paul's. The festivities will run 6 - 8pm each night and volunteers should plan to arrive by 5:45pm. We would love to have volunteer help, and kids join us from Beaver Memorial. Everything is still in the early planning stages, but I wanted to reach out with some basic information and to collect contact information for anyone interested in helping.



Our theme this year is based on the movie Inside Out. (Inside Out 2 is coming out this June I believe.) We will be dealing with emotions of Joy, Sadness, Fear, Disgust, and Anger and related Bible stories. This is a program that we are creating, so graphics and many other details are still in development! For now, here is a link to the trailer of the Inside Out movie on YouTube for those that aren't familiar. You can also stream it if you have Disney Plus or purchase (for less than \$5) on several other streaming platforms.

At this point, I'm collecting volunteer interest. If anyone are interested in helping, they can contact me through email/text. We can always find ways to use people's talents, and all are encouraged to share those with me too! We will need leaders and helpers for nursery (ages 3 and 4), games, crafts, and storytime, helpers for leading crews of kids around (no prep!), and snack

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ATLANTA – CharityWatch, the only independent charity watchdog in the United States, released a report this spring on the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), awarding its highest A+rating for the United Methodist humanitarian and relief agency.

Evaluating on a number of key factors, the report states that UMCOR spends 97% of its cash budget on programming for humanitarian relief, response and recovery work. In addition, it spends \$1 to generate \$100 in donations. Analysis of UMCOR's operations included the work of the Sager Brown Depot and the Immigration Law and Justice Network (ILJN, formerly NJFON), which are wholly owned subsidiaries of UMCOR.

Key factors included the transparency audit practices and the accessibility of financial data, governance policies, governance of the board of directors and privacy policies related to the organization's donors.

According to CharityWatch: "Groups included on the CharityWatch top-rated list generally spend 75% or more of their budgets on programs, spend \$25 or less to raise \$100 in public support, do not hold excessive assets in reserve, have met CharityWatch's governance benchmarks, and receive 'open-book' status for disclosure of basic financial information and documents to CharityWatch."

Beacon Free Shop

Beacon Free Shop was held Saturday, May 18, 2024 and provided personal hygiene products to 89 households. 216 individuals make up these households. 10% of the households served were new, never receiving products from Beacon before. Four new volunteers joined the Beacon force to ensure the distributions ran smoothly.

This was the first month we distributed inventory from our new upstairs storeroom. Our 'inventory control' volunteers clocked many steps by bringing items downstairs.

Beacon's greatest need is always monetary donations. However, if you prefer to provide products – please consider donating 31 oz laundry detergent. It is the most requested item we offer, and the most expensive.

Next Beacon Free Shop will be held Saturday, June 15, 2024 from 10am – 12noon.

New to You Shop

Our fourth New to You event was held on May 18th. We had 74 individuals/families come through who represented 173 household members. Because we no longer limit the number of items someone may take, we seemed to give away many more items. During clean-up, we purged some of the items which we knew had not been taken for several times and took them to Community Aid. This time we were able to set up in an hour and a half, and clean up took only an hour. We are so blessed with volunteers! Thank you all who donated or worked! It's proving to be a wonderful collaboration with First Baptist because we have folks from both churches working together!
